Last two Sundays brought flashes of memories, as I found myself speaking to the camera in an empty sanctuary. Trying to have a meaningful hour of worship that way takes faith. Technology has worked well enough; but can we have authentic worship with people scattered at home?

I do focus on one simple thought: We will honor God by hearing God's word. After all, hearing the word of God is authentic worship: "To obey is better than sacrifice, and to heed than the fat of rams." (1 Sam. 15:22) Austere settings sometimes lead us to focus on the invisible. In the Bible everyone from Moses to Elijah to Jesus went into the desert for a time to be with God alone.

Yet at the same time, we are meant to be together. We are not meant to be in the desert permanently. "God is love"; and we are called to love one another. There is a time to be alone, and there is a time to gather.

They say that the next big thing is the so-called metaverse. It is an online, virtual world where people interact through their avatars. No doubt it has interesting possibilities. But it should not replace real world interactions any more than sodas should eliminate water. We are to meet one another as our true selves (Col. 3:9), namely, as those belonging to Christ, and that is the blessing of the church.

As we invest to seek God, so let us also gather as people of God. I hope to spend more time in meeting you in person in the coming days.

We voted to continue our monthly \$50 donation to the organizations that are chosen by the Mission and Evangelism Team. We also renewed our pledge of \$10 per person per month to York River District UMW.

We reported our 2021 year-end statistics to the Church office. We have increased our membership by one member (Welcome to Janet Burgess!) and we donated to \$1,634.00 to local charitable organizations.

At our meeting, we assembled 24 UMCOR Hygiene Kits. As directed by YRD these kits were to be distributed to our local community instead of being sent to the annual conference. These kits which contain personal hygiene items such as towel, washcloth, soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, bandages, comb, and nail clippers were gratefully accepted by Lauren Oden at Mathews County Social Services.

Our United Methodist Women have offered to assist the United Methodist Men with the Art Sale that they are planning on March 26th from 9 to 1 in the Fellowship Hall. Coffee will be served and the UMW will have baked goods available for sale. Donations of Art Works are to be collected between March 19th through March 25th.
