Heart Havens Month



It was only 18 years ago that the United Methodists here in Virginia, voted unanimously to establish Heart Havens as a ministry of the Virginia Conference during Annual Conference. God provided us a vision of inclusivity and independence and unconditional love for our brothers and sisters with intellectual disabilities. February has been established as Heart Havens Month, the time to re-new our commitment and consider those living with disabilities.

Heart Havens empowers adults with intellectual disabilities to live and thrive in a safe and nurturing environment. We accomplish this through the management of 12 group homes across Virginia. Heart Havens homes are located in Colonial Beach, Kilmarnock, 2 in Virginia Beach, Newport News, 2 in Richmond, Ashland, Stuarts Draft, Winchester and 2 in Lynchburg.

Earlier homes were purchased and adapted to fit the residents' needs, but today our homes are built to support individuals with multiple handicaps. With each new home we've made improvements on functionality and accessibility. The homes are outfitted with seamless entry for individuals using wheelchairs. Sinks and showers are easily accessed and wide hallways and doors provide easy entrance.

But Heart Havens is about more than houses. Houses are just a means of support. Heart Havens is about people. People are what drive this ministry: the people we support, their families, the people who work in the homes every day, the volunteers who maintain and visit our homes and the people who make financial gifts to sustain our day to day operations. These are the people who shape Heart Havens day after day, year after year.

Heart Havens provides opportunities for people with Intellectual Disabilities to pursue their dreams of an independent lifestyle, to be a part of a


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From the Pastor's Pen...

The recent frigid weather and snow remind me of my childhood. We got more snow back then in Northern Virginia, and when you're a child, it doesn't take much snow to reach the tops of your red rubber boots!

I don't know how Mom did it with my three sisters and me! She would patiently help us climb into our snow suits, pull on fat mittens, scarves, toboggans, and boots. Then, almost without fail, as soon as the four of us were lined up to march outside into the white wonderland, one of us would have to go to the bathroom! Mom's patience prevailed and we eventually spent a couple of hours building snow forts, snowmen, and making snow angels.

After our fun, we trekked the snow and ice into the house, and the warm outer clothing, now soaked and cold, peeled off as we headed to the kitchen for hot chocolate or soup. I will always remember how our long front hallway looked: boots, socks and mittens lined up to dry on top of the warm baseboard heater, just waiting for us to don them and go outside again.

The writer of Colossians implores us to put on a different kind of clothing. Just as we dress appropriately for various kinds of weather, followers of Christ are to clothe themselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, patience, and love. This "clothing" is not optional, nor can we purchase it from any store; this clothing is available to us only through the work of the Holy Spirit as we submit our lives daily to following Christ.

Dressed in these "holy tempers," as Methodist founder John Wesley referred to these attributes¹, we will live together in harmony, bearing with one another when we disagree, and forgiving one another, just as the Lord has forgiven each of us.

Of course, it's easy to nod and say that we should to be compassionate, kind, humble ... loving and forgiving, but most of us could give examples where we struggle with these tempers. We may not even really want to exercise these tempers with certain people in our lives.

What are we to do? How do we grow more like Christ in this life? How do we desire to be clothed as Colossians and other scriptures admonish us? The truth is that we cannot do this on our own. We need a combination of God's grace and one another to enable us to "put on" the attributes of the Lord Jesus Christ. Practicing spiritual disciplines will help, such as public and private prayer, Bible reading, partaking of the Lord's Supper, and fasting.

Toward that end, I invite you to join me during the season of Lent to explore forgiveness. Adam Hamilton's short book, Forgiveness: Finding Peace Through Letting Go, will be the springboard for this six-week bible study. If you are one of most of us who find forgiveness difficult, you won't want to



God's Green Earth

The Creation Care Team continues to look for businesses in Mathews that recycle responsibly. We have found another one:

Love Repair

17087 John Clayton Memorial Highway (On Route 14, 1 mile from Ward's Corner) Mathews, VA 23109

This automotive business recycles in 5 different areas:

- PLASTIC: containers of oil, antifreeze, transmission and washer fluid plus plastic drink bottles
- CARDBOARD: boxes from parts and supplies.
 Some cardboard gets reused as a floor protector, then is recycled.
- METAL and ALUMINUM: All the metal and aluminum parts from vehicles are sent to a metal recycler in Middlesex.*
- BATTERIES: All used car batteries are taken back by the distributor to be recycled.*
- OIL: Oil from oil changes is reused in a furnace for heating -- a unique reuse/recycle.
- * Small batteries and aluminum cans are brought to the church to support church projects.

Love Repair is a model in recycling.

Members of the Creation Care team attended a United Methodist District meeting on the Green Church initiative on January 16. The team continues to work on recycling plastic containers and tops in cooperation with the school system and other similar projects.

Remember that cardboard recycled in Mathews results in money back to the county. If you have ideas for recycling or other conservation tips please let the creation care team know. Look for our rack cards at the library and other places around town.

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Finance Committee

The beginning of a new year is a good time to take a look at our year-end financial condition and look ahead to 2014. We closed 2013 with a balance of \$59,289 in our operating account, which is down from \$87,294 in 2012 and also at the lowest level in several years. The lower balance is partly a result of voluntary expenditures above budget in the last few years for worthwhile reasons, mainly for building/grounds improvements and disaster relief.

Overall, our operating financial condition is good, but not without concern. As shown in the graph below, general operating income is not keeping pace with expenses and is not growing as in previous years. To meet expenses, we have drawn out of our savings reserve, which is now at its lowest level in many years. In the last several years, we have increased our budget along with the growth in our income and consistent with our mission to use our resources to witness for Christ. It is not unexpected to have some ups and downs in our financial situation, as there can be many factors involved: economy, membership turnover, unusual expenses, etc.


As we enter 2014, your Finance Committee is examining ways in which we at Central can

continue to meet current expenses and extend our outreach with new programs and opportunities within the local church and into the community and the world. Every gift – whether big or small – is important and meaningful. Let's all take a look at our giving in 2014; maybe we have not made any changes in recent years and it's time to recalibrate. Upon reflection, Members may want to consider increasing their 2014 gifts. Whatever your decision, your Finance Committee thanks you for your generous support and acknowledges that each giver is important, regardless of gift amount. We on the Finance Committee welcome any questions and suggestions you have.
