From the Pastor's Pen

It dawns on me these days that so many people in our world are horribly suffering. That is not a new situation, but the war in Ukraine has laid bare its reality in stark detail. Here I am used to earnestly praying for one person at a time, one surgery at a time. But in Europe's second largest country, tens of thousands have been killing and being killed, their limbs blown to bits, their children caught in explosions, and entire cities trapped without food, water, or heat. Scores of hospitals and healthcare facilities have been bombed to rubbles. Millions of refugees have left behind their husbands, sons, and fathers. It is sickening; it is evil.

Ukraine is not the only violent conflict or massive disaster we can name from memory. I think of how half a million people perished in Syria. Bombings still continue in Yemen. They are forecasting a desperate food crisis in Afghanistan. North Korea is a prison state. Myanmar. China. Central America overrun by cartels. The list goes on. Our own country has sufferings of its own, as do our neighbors and friends.

If we as Christians can do something for some of these people to lessen their suffering, it would be a worthwhile effort. For example we will send our gifts to United Methodist Committee on Relief as well as to International Rescue Committee. It may be a small effort against what is happening, but with Jesus we can say, "My Father is still working, and I also am working." (John 5:17)

Our calling is to share with the world that God is still love. At such a time as this, it speaks to us deeply that God was incarnated into this world, and that he suffered and died alongside us. He also rose again, overcoming death itself. If we could somehow learn of his spirit and love, we are bound to bring more hope into this world.

Even as we face the sufferings of our fellow humans, now is the time to deeply meditate on the passion of Christ and his resurrection.

Mission Focus for April: Hands Across Mathews



Hand Across Mathews seeks to help local families who have suffered some crisis that puts them in need of the basic amenities of food, clothing, shelter, prescription medications or fuel. HAM has combined the efforts of 35 churches to provide non-denominational charitable aid to families, which have been evaluated and approved by the Mathews County Social Services Department. The following statistics summarize its efforts in the past year:

- The budget for programs exceeds \$140,000 annually;
- Between 95 and 100 families per week are receiving food;
- Approximately 70 volunteers provide over 9,000 hours of services each year.

Recycling Saves Money for the County

Each time a trash truck takes paper and cardboard to the landfill with other Items, it costs Mathews about \$209. Instead, we could take time to throw the paper into the recycle bin. Why is it important?



- Because every truckload of paper that goes to be recycled brings in to Mathews \$350 to \$450 revenue.
- 2) Because 1 ton of recycle paper can save 17 trees.
- Because paper accounts for 25% of landfill waste. When paper or cardboard starts to decompose in a landfill, it gives off methane gas, a big contributing factor to climate change.
