Holy Week and Easter are around the corner, and it feels, this year we are out of the pandemic's long shadow. Mathews Ministers Association is offering daily noon services during the next

week at Westville Christian Church (next to the library) from Monday through Friday. There will be special music as well as homily each day. On Maundy Thursday (Apr. 6) we will have a 'living Last Supper' in the fellowship hall: A cast of men will dramatize Jesus' Passover meal with his disciples in Jerusalem, and it will be followed by a quiet celebration of the Holy Communion in the sanctuary. On Easter morning we are once again gathering at the Old Field Point for a sunrise service, with the service and Sunday schools following at regular times.

Mission Focus for April: Hands Across Mathews

Hand Across Mathews seeks to help local families who have suffered some crisis that puts them in need of the basic amenities of food, clothing, shelter, prescription medications or fuel. HAM has combined the efforts of 35 churches to provide non-denominational charitable aid to families, which have been evaluated and approved by the Mathews County Social Services Department. The following statistics summarize its efforts in the past year:

- The budget for our Programs exceeds \$140,000 annually;
- Between 95 and 100 families per week are receiving food;
- Approximately 70 volunteers provide over 9,000 hours of services each year.
