From the Pastor's Pen

It has been a month of joy for me here at Central Church and in Mathews. I say that despite feeling that, for the past couple of months, I have lived in a whirlwind. New church, new people and places—I have rarely felt less in control over what goes on around me. I have also felt the weight of responsibilities. There were times I was frustrated because I could not do everything I had meant to do during this time of transition.

At the same time, wonderful works have been done that I could not have accomplished on my own. Our meetings have been warm and kind. The worship services have been uplifting. Children have welcomed me. There is a sense that, even as I write the story of my next chapter, more importantly I am a part of the story that God is writing. There was a time when I rather dismissed the idea, but since I put my faith in Christ, somehow it continues to be true. I have tried to be open to where the Spirit might be moving and to be responsive to what often feels like wind that blows in my face.

Above all else, the church is a story that God is writing. What may be truly important for us then is a posture of openness and listening. As Graham Standish wrote in his book, "Becoming a Blessed Church": "What I have consistently noticed in almost all thriving congregations ... is that what makes the difference is the extent to which the community is open to God at its core." This seems to be a message that I get repeatedly these days. From such openness comes the direction for the next faithful step, where we ride the surf that God has generated in his prevenient grace.

I am keenly aware that such openness begins with me, and that is why I have leaned on my spiritual disciplines. For some of you who wrestle with an idea of praying, journaling, or reading the Scripture for a certain amount of time, such as an hour, my suggestion is:



Forget about the hour at first; focus on quality over quantity; adopt a child-like faith and be open to God's grace. You will soon find that time to be life-giving.

I look forward to what God will continue to do in our midst.

2015 Annual Conference Report

Once again thank you for the privilege of being your Annual Conference representative.

Bishop Young Jin Cho opened the conference with his Episcopacy Address, stating that the most important mission of the Virginia Conference is that of making disciples of Christ. He challenged our churches to focus on going "From Members to Disciples." He also mentioned that 429 faith communities were started since 2008 and an additional 33 are slated to open between now and the 2016 General conference.

Throughout the conference we voted for the 2016 General Conference and Southeast Jurisdictional Conference delegates. This year we used electronic balloting, using handheld devices that looked much like a remote control. Following multiple ballots throughout the conference, 11 clergy and 11 lay delegates were elected for General Conference, with additional 22 delegates and alternates elected for the Southeast Jurisdictional Conference.

A Service of Remembrance was held for the conference members who had died in the past year. The sermon was delivered by the Rev. Young Bong Kim, who emphasized that the Kingdom of God is not just in Heaven but also is here now and to be embraced and lived out. He closed by saying "We are God's Kingdom People." He quoted Mr. Wesley as saying: "We should be in the world and not of it." Holy Communion was then received.

Marcia Maxwell reported on the Imagine No More Malaria campaign. She told the delegates that the giving totals from the churches in our conference stood at more than \$864,540, meaning that 86,454 lives have been saved. Our Bishop made an appeal for "extra mile giving," himself giving additional \$2,000 towards the conference goal of 1 million dollars. Bishop's appeal resulted in an impromptu giving from the floor of \$28,560 in cash and \$22,000 in pledges. The revised total was \$917,100. We may make it yet!

Former bishop Charlene Kammerer presented a lovely message for the Service for the Ordering of Ministry. Her sermon for the newly licensed, commissioned and ordained clergy as well as delegates centered on the Scripture: "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." The 2015 annual Conference ended with worship and the Fixing of Appointments by Bishop Cho.

Other bits and highlights include:

- The Harry Denman Award for Evangelism was given in 3 categories: Clergy, laity and youth. The Clergy winner was Rev. Paul Beighley, III. in recognition of his prison Ministry. Patricia Hobbs received the laity Award for her outreach. The Denman Award for Youth was given to Anna Lopynski for her work as an encourager.

- It was announced that the Annual Conference offering total was \$128,890. Conference members brought 42,743 disaster relief kits for United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). Kits included 23,672 health kits; 11,835 school kits; 4,533 birthing kits; 1,965 layette kits; 180 cleaning kits; 111 bedding kits and 547 sewing kits. The total number of donated kits exceeded last year's offerings by more than 1,500. Central UMW donated 55 Health Kits this year. In addition, more than 8500 lb. of cans were collected as a result of the Cans 4 Conference Mission.

- We were given a report from United Methodist Family Services. As an unwavering presence to children and families at risk, they have a goal to develop 100 partner churches in the next year.

- Denise Honeycutt, Deputy General Secretary of the Conference, gave the Virginia Conference an award for its giving to UMCOR, which is celebrating 75 years of service this year.

- Dr. Timothy Bias, General Secretary of the General Board of Discipleship, led two moving and challenging sessions of Bible studies.

- Resolutions: Discussions included caring for God's creation through improved investment policies. Petitions to the 2016 General Conference on human sexuality were discussed and then voted on by written ballot.
