

#### From the Pastor's Pen

Emmanuel Still Means "God Is with Us"


Here we are in Advent again, longing for the good news of Christmas to break upon our lives once more! For some, however, the Christmas season is difficult. Loss of loved ones, financial setbacks, illness, distance and divisions in the family unit are just some of the reasons for this.

I am so thankful for the stories in Scripture that confirm we are not alone in such struggles. Even the story of Mary's unexpected pregnancy as an unwed teen, and Joseph's wrestling with what to do about it, remind us of the reason Jesus came – because we needed, and still need, a Savior! (Read Matthew 1:18-25.)

Two names are given the unborn child in Matthew's Gospel: **Jesus**, meaning "to help" or "to save," and **Emmanuel**, meaning "God is with us."

Think about it: in the midst of the disgrace of being pregnant before marriage, God's assurance enables Mary and Joseph to move forward in faith despite of the stares and barbed judgments they surely encountered from their community. In their uncertainty, God was with them! God's love was present, even when they were uncertain of where their journey was taking them!

I am reminded of another story. Atop an old barn stood an ancient weather vane that had withstood many a windstorm over the decades. The wind indicator arrow was inscribed



with the words, "God is Love." A friend poked fun at the words on an arrow that changed direction with each fickle breath of wind.

"Yep," he said, "God's love cannot be counted on; it's always changing."

The farmer just smiled. "It all depends on how you look at it, my good friend. The truth is, whichever way the wind blows, God is love."

This simple truth is borne out in the Scriptures

and lives of those who love God. The winds of life are not always gentle breezes; they may unexpectedly sweep us off the ground like a tornado uproots houses and trees. As the Nationwide commercial puts it, "Life comes at you fast" – and hard, at times.

As we find ourselves in the holiday season, the consumer-driven world tries to excite us with beautiful light displays, nostalgic movies, wonderful gift ideas, holiday sales, special foods, and catchy music. Depending on what you and your loved ones are facing at this time, the holiday hype and well meaning words like "be of good cheer" may leave you feeling sad, indifferent, or even angry.

Whether this is the best Christmas ever for you or the most difficult, here are a few thoughts that I hope will be helpful.

- It is okay to <u>not</u> "be of good cheer"! Be honest with your feelings and don't simply put on a happy face for others – they will understand.
- Don't try to compete with Charles Dickens or Martha Stewart and have the "perfect" Christmas celebration. It's alright to scale back on decorating, gift buying, baking and merrymaking.
- Experience real "comfort and joy" by connecting with others. Christmas is really about relationships, after all. Reach out to others in similar circumstances; pray for those who are not able to visit you; volunteer your services to help others in the community; visit those in a nursing home; attend church services.
- Don't be afraid to smile or even laugh when, in the midst of illness or grief, something fills you with joy – seize such moments, for they bring healing to heavy hearts.
- Allow the true meaning of Christmas to ease your soul. God's gift of Love on that first Christmas still brings hope to all who look to him!

How comforting it is to know that, no matter

The year is fast coming to an end and 2015 will be upon us before we know it. There is one project left for the M&E Team in 2014 -Christmas Shoe Boxes for children in Mathews County. The boxes are due by Thursday, December 4 to the fellowship hall or Sunday, December 7 to Mathews Social Services. The boxes will be included in The Christmas Store sponsored by Social Services.

The Hands Across Mathews (HAM) program for 2015 will begin on Sunday, December 28, 2014 and end on Sunday, December 20, 2015. As we have done in the past three years, we ask that you establish an affordable dollar amount (with yourself) and each week purchase non-perishable food items for HAM. Place these items in the HAM green tub in the fellowship hall.

Songs, Soups, Salads and Sweets will be held on Sunday, January 18, 2015 at 5:00 pm for songs and 6:00 pm for the meal portion of the event. At this writing, Ebenezer Baptist Church Men's Choir, Gary Painter, along with Janet Bowman and Pastor Suzanne will be our guests.

Any left-over soup will be put in quart jars and given to those who could use a blessing (such as those who are ill). A love offering will be received to aid our missionaries. I hope to see you there.

#### Shoe Boxes for Christmas

The Mission and Evangelism Team is sponsoring a shoebox ministry for needy children in the Mathews Community. The boxes will be distributed through the Mathews Social Services Christmas Store. Bring filled boxes to the fellowship hall by Thursday, December 4 or deliver donations to Mathews Social Services no later than December, 7 so they can be marked and sorted.



- <u>Shoe Box</u>: Use any empty, clean box. Fill with a variety of all **new** items. Wrap in Christmas paper. Pray for the child who will receive the box. Attach a separate piece of paper to the box and label it for a boy or girl and age category: 2-4, 5-6, 7-9 or 10-14 years.
- <u>Toy Suggestions</u>: Small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, playing cards, stickers, puzzles, games, etc.
- <u>School Supplies</u>: Pens, pencils, sharpeners, crayons, colored markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, blunt pointed scissors, or regular ones for older children, glue, colored craft paper.
- <u>Hygiene Items</u>: Tooth brushes, tooth paste, mild bar soap in wrapper, combs, washcloths, hand towels, and small shampoo.
- Other items: Candy appropriate for age of child, T-shirts, socks, gloves, adjustable ball caps, hair clips, jewelry, flash light (extra batteries), Christmas mugs, hot chocolate packets, gift certificates to Hardee's, McDonald's, etc.



#### 2014 Christmas Offering

This year's Christmas Offering will go to the same three charities it helped last year. The Administrative Council voted at the November meeting to allocate 50% to United Methodist Family Services (UMFS), 25% to Hands Across Mathews (HAM) and 25% to the Ruritan Christmas Blessing Fund.



United Methodist Family Services UMFS For 114 years UMFS has been helping children and families in Virginia reach their full potential. Through the treatment foster care program, foster parents and children find one another and often go on to become adoptive families. Through the residential treatment programs at the Child & Family Healing Center and Leland House, girls and boys overcome trauma and heal. Through Charterhouse School, students with special needs and autism find help and success. And through Project LIFE, teens aging out of foster care in Virginia find new skills and a voice. Through all of these services children and families are empowered.

#### Hands Across Mathews



HAM helps local families who have suffered some crisis that puts them in need of the basic amenities of food, clothing, shelter, prescription medications or fuel. When all other avenues of support have been exhausted, HAM helps them get back on their feet. We have combined the efforts of 35 churches to provide non-denominational charitable aid to families, which have been evaluated and approved by the Mathews County Social Services Department.

#### Ruritan Christmas Blessing Fund

Over the years, many people have come to depend on the Christmas Blessing Fund as one source in making ends meet through the winter months. Donations in past years generally exceed the goal of \$25,000 and over 100 families have received much needed financial assistance with their heating expenses.
