We will have a center set up for writing cards and letters to our deployed military personnel – even the postage will be provided. If interest is shown, a group could work on making sympathy, get-well and thinking-of-you cards to send from the church as the need arises. Do you have another idea? Let your pastor know, please!

Projects are expected to take anywhere from 30 minutes to 2 hours or so.

From the Pastor's Pen...

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." (Read Luke 10:25-37)

You might remember this story. While traveling on a Sunday morning, a man stops at a Friends (Quaker) church and goes in for worship. He sits down next to another man and waits for worship to begin. Others come and also sit quietly. No one says anything – no one plays the piano, no one stands up to give a call to worship – there is just silence.

The visitor is perplexed. After a long time, he quietly turns to the man next to him and asks, "When does the service begin?" The man replies, "As soon as we leave the building."

As the saying goes, "We enter to worship; we leave to serve." This is in keeping with Jesus' pattern of ministry. He and his disciples regularly attend worship, yet most of his ministry takes place outside the walls of the synagogue: in homes and village streets, in desert places and on mountain heights, in boats and by the shore. Wherever he goes, Jesus transforms lives through what he says and what he does. He commissions his disciples (and us) to do the same.

As followers of Christ, we gather weekly to worship and praise God. But how well do we practice our faith once we leave the building? Do those in the community see Central Church as a building where certain people worship each week? Or do they see the church called Central regularly engaged in service to the wider community and recognize that Christ's love is their motivation?

Worship and service are inseparable, just like loving God and loving neighbor are inseparable.


2014 Graduates Honored at Central UM Church

- 12) Be kind.
- 11) You only live once.
- 10) Make art.
- 9) Seek balance between work and the rest of life.
- 8) Dream.
- 7) Remember the lessons of history.
- 6) Embrace failure.
- 5) Work hard.
- 4) Don't give up.

The other kind, said Turner, is the speech that tells graduates, "You're not special." Turner said, "The goal of the 'You're Not Special' speech is to say to grads: "As hard as you've worked, you also lucked into plenty, including your parents and your country." This kind of speech includes the theme that with luck comes obligation, and thus, graduates should find a way to serve.

Turner said that the two kinds of speeches complement each other, and that taken together, they say, "Congratulations. You are special. Just remember ... so is everybody else."

Let the Little Children Come



Being a teacher is definitely not for the faint of heart. It is one of the most difficult jobs I have ever done. Difficult, but definitely worth it!

I grew to love teaching preschool last year, so when asked to take on the 3rd grade class in the afternoon, I asked myself, "how much harder could it be?".

Well, after 2 weeks into the school year, I was seriously reconsidering the wisdom of my decision. I was also wondering what God's purpose was for Page 6

putting me with that group. Had I really heard his voice?

The two basic things that seemed to interest the class the most were talking and arguing. More of my time was spent trying to keep them quiet and putting out fires than actual teaching.

I teach at a Christian School that has relatively small class sizes. There are 16 in my 3rd grade class. The majority have been together since preschool and will stay together until they graduate. Needless to say, their interpersonal relationships are very important.

In addition to all the normal English learning stuff, I had also been trying to teach them about respecting and loving each other. However, nothing seemed to be sinking in.

Until One Rainy Day...

We went down to the covered parking area for recess. When I called them to come in, the boys were arguing and fighting about something. One was so angry that I had to physically restrain him from hitting one of his classmates. What really got to me, though was that several were continuing to taunt him even though they knew he had trouble controlling his anger. They were enjoying watching his reaction.

With the help of a male teacher, I was able to get my class safely upstairs and sitting at their desks. And, that is when IT happened.

I was so disappointed and frustrated that the moment I began to speak to them, tears starting trickling down my face. "Uh Oh, the teacher is crying!" The room fell into a complete silence.

"Do you know why I am crying?" I asked.

No answer.

"I am crying because you have no love for each other. God put us together in 3rd grade as a family. You were purposely trying to make a classmate angry and enjoying it. There is no love."

Then, **in that moment** God did something that I had been trying to do for almost 2 months. One of the boys stood up and asked to say something.

With tears flowing he said, "I do not feel safe at home. My family is always fighting. I am in a Christian school where I should feel safe, but all we do in this class is fight too. It should not be that way."

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Suddenly the flood gates opened. Another boy started crying and shared that his parents were going through a divorce. As I looked around the majority of the class was crying, most of them boys. I was completely taken off guard as I strongly felt the presence of God in that room.

I opened my door and saw through the office window that the school's director was unoccupied. I explained to her what was going on. She came in the class, and both of us started praying with the children. I felt a great sense of compassion well up in me as I touched and prayed for each and every one of them. The children then began praying for each other.

I felt like I was part of a scene from the movie "Facing the Giants" as I watched my students ministering to each other.

With just a few minutes left of the school day, I had the students line up to leave. I then sat down on the floor. They all surrounded me, and one of them actually crawled into my lap. As I was sitting there with a rather large 8-year-old boy in my lap, it was then that I realized that it was indeed God's plan for me to teach this class this year.

It was His plan if for no other reason but to witness the miraculous way He used the honesty of an 8year-old boy to accomplish His will and purposes within the hearts of many, including a frustrated school teacher.

Trustees Note to the Congregation

There are currently discussions in our Church community about what physical enhancements are needed to make our church more appealing to our community, not to mention more enjoyable



for our current members. The Trustees want to present to the congregation a short list of enhancements being considered so you know we

are serious about transparency and we <u>solicit your input</u> on any or all of these projects. Any Trustee would be pleased to meet / discuss any project with you. There has been much talk and little action – well, with your support, that is all about to change!

All of these projects will need funding and we want your input on that as well. The Trustees and the Finance Committee are actively engaged in efforts to utilize all available funds as effectively as possible to both fund ongoing church expenses and provide for these upgrades. If you have a strong desire to support any of these projects, we would welcome your support to augment the funds available for Finance Committee project allocation!

- 1) Sanctuary Doors Replace the sanctuary doors with attractive wooden doors beautifying the front of the church and improving ingress / egress. This project was approved unanimously by the Trustees and we want this improvement completed by year end 2014. What the door/doors would look like and how they would be installed have yet to be determined we want your input! We prefer to fund this project with gifts since it was not budgeted in 2014.
- 2) Bathrooms Expand both bathrooms bringing them up to current public building standards and significantly enhance their appearance / function.
- 3) Kitchen expansion We need more space and professional appliances to utilize the kitchen for many of the functions we support. We all have safety concerns when the kitchen is used for large functions such as the twice

- annual shrimp dinner. A fine kitchen makes a fine friend for church functions! We plan to get a professional kitchen designer to help provide designs for congregation comments so we can arrive at the best solution.
- 4) Fellowship Hall redecorations to make the fellowship hall more closely reflect the colors / beauty of our sanctuary. (This would occur after, or in concert with, the kitchen expansion). We plan to get a professional interior designer to provide designs for congregation comments so we can have a very functional/attractive social hall!

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2014 Annual Conference offering goal is \$200.000

Each year members of local churches are encouraged to help raise money for global mission projects designated by the bishop. The pastor or lay representative of each church will take that money to Annual Conference where it will be collected during a special time of the session.

This year the Annual Conference special offering goal is \$200,000. Bishop Young Jin Cho is requesting contributions to support eight different ministries.

"With renewed confidence and commitment our offering will be broad in its scope," Bishop Cho wrote in a letter to all Virginia Conference United Methodists, "as we reach out across Virginia and around the world to renew and strengthen our commitment to those with whom we partner in God's mission."

Contributions are asked for the following ministries:

♦ Imagine No Malaria - \$50,000

Every 60 seconds, malaria claims a life in Africa. Millions of lives, needlessly lost each year. Entire



nations...slipping away. Imagine No Malaria is an extraordinary effort of the people of The United Methodist Church, putting our faith into action to end preventable deaths by malaria in Africa. Achieving this goal requires an integrated strategy against the disease, including prevention, treatment, improving infrastructure, education and communications.



Initiatives of Hope -\$90,000

\$50,000 for Cambodia.

We want to continue to strengthen our partnership with Cambodia by offering support for church construction, Christian

education materials and scholarships for youths and young adults.

\$25,000 for Mozambique. These funds will help strengthen lay leadership training and provide needed improvements in the Mozambique Conference Communications department.

\$15,000 for Brazil. These funds will help grow and expand the Brazil Methodist Church's Shade and Fresh Water program for at-risk street children.



◆ Engaging/Connecting God's Mission Funds -\$10.000

This ministry will promote mission engagement of Virginia Volunteers Conference small membership churches by offering grants to individuals and churches

desiring to begin or strengthen participation in short-term Volunteers in Mission (VIM) trips.

♦ Children Out of Poverty in Virginia - \$30,000

This will provide financial support for two United Methodist ministries serving at-risk children in Virginia:

The Community Outreach Program of Roanoke works to improve the quality of life of inner city children by providing tutoring, school supplies and programs such as You Feed Others weekend meals, Clothing Closet, Christmas Angels and Camp.
