



This year the Annual Conference special offering goal is \$150,000. Bishop Young Jin Cho is requesting contributions to support three different ministries.



### CHILDREN OUT OF POVERTY – VIRGINIA: \$50,000

In Virginia our goal is \$50,000 that will be offering support to mission projects working with the poor in the Danville and Eastern Shore Districts. Both of these districts are working in ministry in areas of



Virginia that are well below the national and state poverty levels. Of particular concern and emphasis are children that are living in poverty.

### UMCOR GLOBAL HEALTH MINISTRIES: \$50,000

\$50,000 will go to UMCOR Global Health ministries to aid the Ebola ravaged countries of Sierra Leone and Liberia. Both of these countries have trained and equipped Health Boards in their United Methodist



Conferences that are working to meet priorities and needs of communities recovering from the Ebola outbreak as well as a holistic approach to health that empowers people to take charge of their own lives and develop positive health-seeking behavior in their communities.

### METHODIST MISSION IN CAMBODIA: \$50,000

We will be offering our continued support to our partnership with the Methodist Mission in Cambodia with \$50,000 as they continue to purchase property for new churches and expand their fast growing mission.

## From the Pastor's Pen

### What Difference Does the Church Make?

It's been happening since the birth of the Church on the day of Pentecost. The Church has experienced grand periods of conversion and growth – usually accompanied by persecution – followed by periods of decline, fewer faith commitments, and spiritual lethargy. Many books have been written to explain this phenomenon, and their broad overview of Christian history may help us keep our own faith journeys in better perspective.

While many today are wringing their hands in despair over what they see as the demise of the Christian faith, I find it helpful to understand that this isn't the first time it's happened, nor will it be the last. The important question is, regardless of whether it's a high or low season for the Church, what difference do the people of God make?

Let's focus on the *reason* for the Church. The Church does not exist as a social club, an exclusive secretive order, a social service organization that just does good deeds for deserving people, or a haven from the rest of the world. If those things – even good things – define any group of believers, then they are doing no more than thousands of other non-profit organizations around the world. These believers may be doing good things, but they are not necessarily doing *God* things.

The Church's mission is to follow *God's* agenda. In other words, the Church exists to carry out the will of God, period. In the United Methodist Church, we speak about making disciples for Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world – after all, that is a good summation of the Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20). Just before he ascended, Jesus promised that his followers would receive power through the Holy Spirit in order to be his “witnesses ... to the ends of the earth.” (Acts 1:8)

So, what difference does the Church make?

Rachel Held Evans wrote an article recently

titled “Want millennials back in the pews? Stop trying to make church ‘cool.’”<sup>1</sup> She shares how many churches are changing their worship style in order to attract Millennials and others who have dropped out of church. They have focused on “cooler bands, hipper worship, edgier programming, impressive technology.” While these changes are not necessarily “wrong,” they are not working!

Why? Because Millennials (and most everyone I can think of) look to the Church to be different from every other organization and institution they know. Above all, they want authenticity. They see many churches placing “more emphasis on marketing Jesus than actually following Him.” David Kinnaman found that these young adults “are not disillusioned with tradition; they are frustrated with slick or shallow expressions of religions.”

So, what difference should the Church make? I like how Evans puts it. She writes,

“You can get a cup of coffee with your friends anywhere, but church is the only place you can get ashes smudged on your forehead as a reminder of your mortality. You can be dazzled by a light show at a concert on any given weekend, but church is the only place that fills a sanctuary with candlelight and hymns on Christmas Eve. You can snag all sorts of free swag for brand loyalty online, but church is the only place where you are named a beloved child of God with a cold plunge into the water. You can share food with the hungry at any homeless shelter, but only the church teaches that a shared meal brings us into the very presence of God.”

What difference is the faith community called Central UMC making in the world? It's a wonderful time to pray and seek God about truly *being Church* in the wonderful place called Mathews, Virginia.
