### Conference, Healthy Church Team Update Guidelines

The following reflects the latest guidelines for in -person worship and meetings:

- Face covering is voluntary. It is recommended that those who are not fully vaccinated wear masks.
- It is no longer required to send in Health Acknowledgement Form.
- One side of the sanctuary will have all pews available for seating. The other side will have every other pew cordoned off.
- Individually wrapped food may be served outdoors.
- No special surface cleaning is required.

We packed and prepared 50 plus lunches with chicken, fruit, veggies, chips, fruit boxes or water for adults and children. We purchased tomato plants and requested donations of 12" pots from our members and congregation. Food Lion gave us a \$30 gift certificate toward the purchase of the chicken and M & M donated pots and discounted the price of the potting soil for our project. The idea for our program was to have each child plant their own tomato plant and to take it home and care for it. Christine Ulrich prepared a step-by-step planting and care guide for each plant and each child was to give their plant a name! Ingenious!

As it turned out, there were only a few Three Rivers families with children that attended. Possibly Covid? School conflicts? Transportation issues? We aren't sure. BUT, we did discover that the Three Rivers Staff of Case Workers (of which there were many in attendance) had not seen each other in over a year! They had only been able to meet via Zoom. They were delighted to actually see each other and visit. They were able to relax and enjoy a peaceful lunch with their coworkers. So our picnic turned into a very successful Three Rivers Staff Picnic.

Never fear, no food went to waste. The Case Workers were on their way to visit their clients after the picnic so we sent the leftover lunches with them. The Case Workers planted tomato plants and took the plants to their clients also. All in all it was a good day! Thank you to all of our members who contributed and to our special volunteers, Joe Arnold, Susan Hill and Louise Witherspoon, who are always on hand to help.

# Mission & Evangelism Mission Focus for June: Three Rivers Healthy Families



Three Rivers Healthy Families is an affiliate of Middle Peninsula-Northern Neck Community Services Board. The organization has served families throughout the area since 1999. Three Rivers Healthy Families' programs are designed for improving outcomes for young children and their families in the areas of development, social supports, health, safety and bonding and attachment.

Central United Methodist Women is a group of women whose purpose is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ; to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

From its beginning, United Methodist Women has focused on ministries with women, children and youth.

In 2009 CUMW in Mathews, led by Christine Ulrich, and Three Rivers Healthy Families began a relationship to link our respective organizations and its many families together. When Christine and her pastor husband, Rev. Carl Ulrich, moved to another church, Dee Bane stepped up to the plate and continued to lead our involvement in Three Rivers. We came together to share our mutual love of children and our respect for families and the difficult task of raising children in this complex and challenging world.

We have shared knowledge and meals together that have been prepared by both groups, bonding together at a common table. We have learned together how to prepare a turkey for a holiday meal, but we also shared concerns on how to handle holiday stress. We learned together how to

grow and cultivate nature's bounty and prepare for the future in a healthy and sustainable way.

We shared new skills to prepare blankets; we learned to make music together with bells, we played games and made desserts to share. From these activities over the last 12 years, it seemed only natural that we should find a way to share these good things with others and document in some way how much it has meant to be a part of this relationship. From this, "The Good Measure Cookbook" came to be.

The title is from Luke 6:38: "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you."

Since the beginning, each minister at Central Church has whole-heartedly supported the relationship with Three Riers Healthy Families. There has been acceptance, yet mindful inclusion of the Church and the role it plays in the lives of our members and support for the mission of both the United Methodist Women and The Three Rivers Healthy Families. We have all grown to be better by having know and worked with each other.

#### **Creation Care**





You may have at least one tree in your yard that you love, while some have many. Besides their lumber, shade and beauty, there are some astonishing facts about their interaction that most of us never knew.

Trees communicate with each other constantly through what some call the "Wood Wide Web"

or Tree Internet.

Creation Care will share a few facts each month. Great information to share with our children and grandchildren and perhaps....there are lessons for us too.



Just like a human community, trees help each other to survive. Some trees that might have fallen around five hundred years ago still live with the aid of surrounding trees of the same species. They do it by surrounding their roots at the stump, then pump sugar into it to keep it alive.

Trees send out warning signals to other trees. One amazing study on the savannah of Africa proved that trees watch each other's back. When giraffes feed on the umbrella thorn acacia trees, the trees started to pump toxic substances into their leaves, which caused giraffes to move away from them. The animals have to back out a hundred yards before starting to nibble on other trees. It's because the neighboring trees of the same species got the signal and pumped up toxic substances in their leaves too to prevent the giraffes from eating them.

Trees work together to establish a sustainable ecosystem. It's quite impossible for a tree to protect itself against the wind and weather when it's alone. But when they work together, sharing their own food and looking out for each one, they can create an ecosystem where all of them survive and thrive.

Together, they can stand against the changes in temperatures, store enough water for the dry season, generate much humidity, and may even withstand floods and strong weather. Trees that grow in this kind of environment have the possibility of growing very old.

Well, friends, we are slowly climbing out of the hole that the pandemic dropped us in. Last month I left you with a lot of questions to be answered in the coming weeks, or maybe months. I only can answer one of them so far and that is, at least for the time being, we will continue with the single in-person service which is also available on-line.

The protocols that some of you may have found to be too restrictive have been loosened quite a bit. Starting last Sunday (5/23) face masks are no longer required for fully vaccinated people. Seating is unrestricted on one side of the sanctuary with the other side still at half capacity for those not fully vaccinated or not yet comfortable with sitting too close to those outside their household. It no longer matters which way you enter or exit the building and the Health Acknowledgement Form is no longer necessary. Maybe some will be more comfortable in coming back to in-person worship with the loosening of the restrictions.

As you can see, we've come a long way, but we have a long way to go and a lot of questions still to be answered. We just need to remember that these answers will come in God's time, not our time, even if that is not at the pace we would like.
