



From the Pastor's Pen

The Joy(!) of Fasting

Recently I took some time for fasting and prayer, and I was reminded why so many have used this particular discipline. I had hoped to hear from God a bit more clearly. But to my surprise I also felt more focused, de-cluttered, and empowered. During those couple of days I accomplished things that had been sitting on my to-do list for a long time. I was afraid (?) that I might resort to fasting more often in the future!

As one prayer reads, God is "more ready to hear us that we are to pray." The challenge may be for us to be more focused in our seeking God. I encourage you to try fasting and praying, so long as your health allows it, especially if you are "hungering" for God strongly. Fasting usually means abstaining from food, but you can also do acts of mercy and justice for your neighbors (Isaiah 58:6-11). If you fast for more than a day, make sure to break it carefully with fruit and vegetable juices and raw fruits.

People have traditionally adopted some form of self-denial during Lent, when we remember Jesus' suffering that led to his resurrection. The paradoxical message of the season is that, when we die, we live! We could ask ourselves this Lent, "What in my life needs to die so that I might become fully alive to God?" The Scripture says in Romans 8:13, "If you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the misdeeds of the body, you will live." During this year's Lent, we could locate and isolate an area of pride, unbelief, or disobedience in our life and "put it to death" by the Spirit. We could so unite ourselves to Christ. We will then wait for the resurrection morning with eager hope.

During the Lent I hope to preach a sermon series titled, "The Righteous Will Live by Faith." It is based upon the Letter to the Romans, and we will explore faith as the key to spiritual living. I also invite you to an Ash Wednesday service on March 6 at 7 in the evening, where we will hear the Scriptures and reflect on the meaning of the season.

The Special General Conference during Feb. 23-26, after much emotional and at times rancorous debate, narrowly passed a plan that maintained the current stance on the same sex marriage and ordination (now subject to judicial review). The result was not unpredictable due to the growing strength of the international block among the delegates, but I suspect the debate is by no means over. While the works of our conferences matter, and the topic is deeply personal to many of us, my hope is that we will continue defining ourselves ultimately by the Spirit of Jesus Christ.

Due to a combination of an oversight on our part and one by the Virginia Conference, as well as several annual and quarterly expenses, we had a larger than usual deficit in January. The good news is that we have the rest of the year to catch up. Don't forget that the Church expenses go on even when you can't be here, so I encourage you to "make up" your giving when you can. Thankyou for remembering your Church even while you're away.

The committee voted to close the Vanguard account and transfer the balance to a money market account at Chesapeake Bank which will earn twice as much interest. We also voted to take about half of the regular checking account (which was earning only a few cents a month) and put it into this same money market account where it will also earn 2%.



UM Women UMCOR Hygiene Kit Drive

Central's UMW will be assembling hygiene kits to send to UMCOR. Hygiene kits provide basic necessities to people who have been forced to leave their homes because of human conflict or natural disaster. Hygiene kits are also used as learning tools in personal hygiene, literacy, nutrition, and cooking classes. Below is a list of items for each kit. If participating, please place the items in the Fellowship Hall. Thank you!

Hygiene Kit Materials:

1–Hand towel (15 x 25—17 x 27 inches)

No kitchen, cleaning, or microfiber towels. **1-Washcloth**

No kitchen, cleaning, or microfiber towels.

Must be sturdy with at least 6 inches of teeth.

No pocket combs or picks.

Rattail and combs without handles are acceptable but must have at least 6 inches of teeth.

1–Toenail or fingernail clipper

No emery boards or metal nail files.

Bath-size soap (3 oz. bar or larger)

No lvory or Jergen's soap. Do not remove from packaging.

1-Adult Toothbrush

Do not remove from packaging. Personal advertising not acceptable.

- **10-Adhesive bandages (3/4 by 3 inches)** Common household bandages acceptable.
- 1-One-gallon size re-sealable bag

Assembly Instructions

- 1. Lay hand towel flat on a table.
- 2. Lay the washcloth in the center of the hand towel.
- 3. Place all remaining items on top of the washcloth (except the plastic bag).
- 4. Fold the sides of the hand towel to cover the items.
- 5. Grasp the bundle tightly and roll over the remainder of the towel.
- 6. Place the tightly rolled bundle in the plastic bag, remove air, and seal.

Important notes

- All items must be new.
- Do not wash any of the items as they will no longer be considered new.
- Do not include any personal notes, money or additional materials in the kits.
- Contents of kits or the containers of kits should not be imprinted with cartoon characters, advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols.

Dear Virginia Conference,

Before our live stream event on March 4, I wanted to share how much I've missed each one of you, my Cabinet and the work of the annual conference. I want to thank those in the conference for the prayers and the expressions of love during my hip surgeries.



Like many of you I watched the last four days of General Conference with anticipation, uncertainty but, ultimately, hope for the future for The United Methodist Church. I was even so bold to believe that maybe a

"miracle" could happen on the General Conference floor that would finally unite us to be the body of Christ called United Methodist.

Well, that didn't happen. Instead, I saw deep pain from many delegates, tears that rolled down cheeks and the anger that once again "human sexuality" was the main issue of the denomination.

I know that some of you are pleased with the outcome and others are deeply saddened and hurt by the results. Human sexuality, if we are really honest with ourselves, is a topic that we will never agree upon as evidenced by the votes at General Conference. We must understand that the beauty of our beloved denomination is that we are a global church and in some places the topic of human sexuality is life or death.

Our reactions to the 2019 General Conference legislative proceedings and decisions are as diverse as the theological perspectives of the Virginia Annual Conference. Our reactions and perspectives cross spectrums from convictions that God's will was done to a belief that we've moved farther away from God's will. As your Bishop, I want to affirm that ALL people are valued and of sacred worth. To the brothers and sisters of the LGBTQIA+ community, know that you are loved and accepted in our local churches. I can't imagine how you must feel once again.

As your Bishop, I want to affirm the evangelical community that often times feel their beliefs are misunderstood and driven by animosity, instead of their deep abiding faith in Jesus Christ.

I want to assure you that I will live my life consecrated as a Bishop to lead the whole Church in claiming its mission in making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. (BOD, ¶ 403).

Remember my brothers and sisters in the Virginia Conference that the shared work we do in the Virginia Conference is vital. The work we do as The United Methodist Church is lifegiving.

Though our hearts are bruised and our souls have been affected by this General Conference, we remain the Church. We still have a mission, and there are still so many hearts and lives that can be transformed through the work of God.

Let us work together as One. Let us turn to God in these unsettling times. Let us encourage one another and allow the Holy Spirit to guide us. Let us stay "United" as the body of Christ called Methodist.
