From the Pastor's Pen

A Season of Learning

I attended a number of seminars in March and April. Dinner Church Encounter (3/26) explored a new form of church as a weekly dinner. At Boyd Institute lectures at Virginia Wesleyan University (4/8-9), we retraced our denomination's history. Most recently I attended a clergy ethics seminar presented by Professor Sondra Wheeler of Wesley Theological Seminary, where attendees explored moral leadership of the clergy and the church.

A common thread running through these themes is a struggle to recover the authentic church. Who are we, and what are we called to do? 'Dinner Church' presenters, for example, asserted that the church was called to be a rescue mission. Jesus said, "I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance." So they invited people to suppers in the city, where people you would not ordinarily see in church came in great numbers. They even voluntarily stayed for Jesus stories and worship songs; it turned out that people who were averse to churches were not averse to Jesus.

I also learned at Boyd that early Methodist churches *required* their members to be part of class meetings. In class meetings people inquired into one another's spiritual state ("How is it with your soul?"). Smaller number of people joined bands, which were not required, and there each answered the following questions:

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1. What known sins have you committed since our last meeting?
2. What temptations have you met with?
3. How were you delivered?
4. What have you thought, said, or done, of which you doubt whether it be sin or not?
5. Have you nothing you desire to keep secret?



In other words, mutual encouragement and accountability marked the early Methodist churches. Class meetings however became Sunday Schools, and bands became prayer meetings.

Dr. Wheeler also highlighted the church as moral and ethical community. Church should not be, she said, indistinguishable from the world. People ought to be church not just to find encouragement and support, but to follow the teachings of Christ. Jesus' words are often greatly challenging—for example, "Love your enemies,"—but there are ways to honestly and responsibly face them.

I enjoyed attending these meetings, and it will take me some time to reflect on their implications for Central Church. As you know, many churches, including our own, are faced with a challenge to remain faithful and fruitful in changing times. But it seems tantamount for us to remember who we are, even as we look for ways to reach out.

I once heard a church member and Director of Women's Bureau at the Department of Labor reflecting on her career in public service. Like many she had relied on determination and hard work, but the most important thing in public service, she found, was "to know who I am." Her answer makes more sense to me as the years go by.

There is no better time to remember who we are than these wonderful seasons of Easter leading up to Pentecost! May God's Spirit bring to our mind all that Jesus said and did, grounding us in history and forming and shaping us towards the future.

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UMVIM Trip to St. Croix - Janet Burgess

*"Where have you been?" and
"Where are you going?"*

"Where have you been?" and "Where are you going?" These are phrases that greet me after someone says "Hi". They are interested in what disaster recoveries I have been a part of recently. I don't mind the questions and I am eager to share what UMVIM and other religious organizations are doing throughout the world to help those affected by natural disasters.

Recently I returned from St. Croix, Virgin Islands, which were hit by Hurricanes Irma and Maria within two weeks of each other in 2017. Hurricane Maria was the worst natural disaster on record to affect the Leeward Islands since 2004. This hurricane achieved its peak intensity over the eastern Caribbean with maximum

sustained winds of 175 mph. When crossing St Croix, Maria's outer eye wall was at Category 5 intensity. Recognizing the date of 2017, my trip was in 2019, two years after the disasters.

What was unique for this particular trip was the Lutheran Disaster Services were involved in casework, United Methodist Volunteers in Mission were sending crews, and we were housed in a Baptist school, which was once an Episcopal School. And, the US Federal Emergency Management Agency subsidized the trip through airfare and per diems. These are the organizations in the United States working together for one goal, no one trying to out do the other, no one crying foul, just Christ-centered ordinary folks, some with

special skills in construction or emotional and spiritual care, looking after those less fortunate.

Our team on this trip was made up of members of St Luke's UMC. I had received the invitation in October to participate and I extended it to the team as I often join them on recovery missions. We numbered 10 and met with others from PA, MD, and NY to create several teams.

The team on which I joined was assigned to replace a tin roof on a house. Now I used to do roofs, yes I did not mind climbing up ladders and

walking on slippery slopes, and hammering down shingles in the hot sun. Yes you caught the past tense in the previous sentence. (My cardiologist has banned me from roofs, but I still can help rebuild houses at ground level and help rebuild people at heart level.)

Our homeowner's name was Juanita. Her house had been leaking since the 2017 hurricanes. Her handicapped son had to be moved to Miami, FL because of the leaks. We wanted the family to be together again. Each nail in the felt and in the tin brought him closer to home. We worked from 7AM 'til 4 PM each day. Evenings and weekends were free. For

two weeks the roofers clambered up and down the ladders and across the hot tin. I worked ground crew with the chop saw, gathered and handed-off supplies, and painted, as needed.

Lunches were delightful as a Mango tree, of which I

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was allergic, shaded us and we enjoyed Empanadas that Juanita made from scratch.

We were able to tour the island on our time off, attending the Mardi Croix (Gras) Parade, visiting historic sites, snorkeling, shopping, beachcombing, attending the Sunday Beach Church, and enjoying the company of new friends.

The travel to St Croix entailed three plane changes and 14 hours each way, but the experience is rewarding to help others with Christ at our center. Responding to disasters are no longer just work trips for me, it is a lifestyle in helping others along the road of life. "Where have you been?" and "Where are you going?" I am listening for the call!
