My hope is that this is part of God's grace making all things to work together for his good purpose, including a time of renewal and growth at Central.

Mission Focus for May is:

Many people think abusers are crazy, unpredictable, or out of control, however, that isn't necessarily true. Anyone, man or woman, can be an abuser. It results from a batterer's need to exert power and control over their victim. Domestic violence occurs when one partner in an intimate relationship controls the other through force, intimidation or the threat of violence. This can also be in the form of financial abuse.

Children and teens often see and hear more than we may be aware of. They don't however always understand what is happening or why it is happening. Domestic violence hurts a child's self-esteem. They may not participate in school activities, have fewer friends, get in trouble more often.

While the United States is a very diverse country filled with different ideas about domestic violence, it is important to realize that culture cannot be used as an excuse for domestic violence.

Avalon center works to end domestic and sexual violence by breaking the cycle of abuse through prevention, education, shelter and support services in the Middle Peninsula and Williamsburg areas. By offering avenues for safety, self-sufficiency, and empowerment Avalon seeks to break the cycle of abuse. This can help build a stronger, healthier community for all of us.

Avalon Center provides free and confidential shelter and support services to all survivors of abuse including adult and youth counseling, case management, legal advocacy, supervised visitation and custody exchange. It collaborates closely with law enforcement, local and state agencies, and schools. All Avalon services are provided in confidence and without charge. The recent pandemic has heightened the need for Avalon services as families are spending more time together in confined spaces.

If someone you know is a victim of domestic violence, let your friend know that you care and are willing to listen. Don't try to force the issue, but allow your friend to come you to talk when they're ready to confide in you. Try to keep an open mind as you lend a sympathetic ear. Don't blame or criticize you friend for what's been happening. Don't underestimate the risk for potential danger. Remember that you friend must make their own decision about their life.

Realize that a battered person's ties to their abuser are complex. Finances, economic hardship, the belief that children need both parents, hope that the situation will change, fear that if he/she leaves, if He/she could lose custody of the children will all factor into the decision to stay or go.

When your friend asks for advice on what to do, guide them to community resources like the Avalon Center.


Also, on June 23rd, CUMW will be hosting our annual picnic with the children and mothers of Three Rivers Healthy Families at Port Fun. Details to follow.
