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Q&A: Rise Against Hunger Meal Packaging Event Nov, 17 (Sun) 3:30 – 5:30 p.m. Central United Methodist Church

Who is Rise Against Hunger?

Rise Against Hunger (RAH) is a hunger relief nonprofit organization that coordinates the packaging and distribution of food and other aid to people in developing nations. Founded in 1998, it is best known by meals put together by volunteers. As of this article, over 503 million total meals were packaged—623,592 this week alone. RAH and its partner organizations have served people in 77 countries.

Sending meals is only a part of RAH's approach towards its goal of ending hunger by 2030. It seeks to empower communities through better agricultural methods and income-generating initiatives. RAH also responds to emergencies, such as Hurricane Dorian in this year. 285,000 plus Rise Against Hunger meals, plus soap and hygiene kits, were sent to Bahamas, where ADRA International and Convoy of Hope are assisting in aid distribution to those impacted by the storm.

What is a meal packaging event, and how does it work?

On the day of the event, a truck from RAH will deliver food supplies and equipment, and its staff person(s) will guide volunteers into putting together meal packages in an assembly-line fashion. Ingredients to be combined and sealed into a package are rice, soy, dehydrated vegetables and a flavoring mix that includes essential vitamins and minerals.

Where will the meals we package go?

Rise Against Hunger partners with nonprofits around the world to provide food. RAH provides meals for schools, vocational training programs, early childhood development programs, orphanages, and medical clinics. Recent blog entries tell stories from the following cases: ORPHANetwork serving an impoverished neighborhood in Managua, Nicaragua; a kindergarten in Quang Ngai province of Vietnam; a girls' school in a rural

community in Tremesse, Haiti; a school in Kibera, Kenya, through the partner organization, Feed the Hungry UK.



RAH meals have a shelf life of about two years. When the meals put together by our volunteers are shipped, RAH will notify us and let us know its destination.

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What is our commitment for the meal packaging event?

We have committed to provide the location and 50 volunteers in order to put together 10,152 meals. Each meal costs \$0.34, and we have committed to a donation of \$3,451.68. We have invited area United Methodist churches and Three Rivers Healthy Families to join efforts by sending volunteers.

How difficult is the work on the meal packaging day?

Those who previously took part in the events will tell you that the work is not strenuous or difficult at all. Children and youth have easily participated. We will need 5-6 persons during 2:30-3:00 who could bring in some heavier equipment into fellowship hall.

Do volunteers need to register?

Although RAH encourages all volunteers to register, it is not a requirement. By signing up at the church you will help us make sure that we have enough volunteers for the event.

Can I come as an observer/cheerleader?

Yes. Church and community members are encouraged to come and be part of the event.

What led the church leadership to commit to Rise Against Hunger meal packaging event?

November is a season of Thanksgiving, and RAH gives us a way to give thanks through an act of sharing. We will not only share a meal as a church family but also with our neighbors who are in need of nourishing meals. I encourage you to make your gift towards RAH a thank-offering that is cheerfully given for innumerable blessings we have received from God's hands.

In addition, this year we have been given a major gift, that is, an extensive make-over of our fellowship hall, through the Bailey Hudgins bequest. Giving as a church through labors of our own hands, would be a great way to give thanks to God and to celebrate this gift.

Will we still have our annual church Thanksgiving dinner?

RAH meal packaging event will be immediately followed by a supper. Turkey and meat will be provided; you are invited to add a side dish to the mix!

How can I give towards the cost of Rise Against Hunger meals that we are putting together?

Mark your gifts to Central United Methodist Church as "*Rise Against Hunger*." Envelopes are available in the pews.

Shoe Boxes for Christmas



The Mission and Evangelism Team continues its sponsorship of the shoebox ministry for needy children in the

Mathews Community. The boxes will be distributed through the Mathews Social Services Christmas Store.

Bring filled boxes to the fellowship hall by Sunday, December 1st.

<u>Shoe Box</u>: Use any empty, clean box. Attach a separate piece of paper to the box and label it for a boy or girl and age category: 2-4, 5-6, 7-9 or 10-14 years. Fill with a variety of all **new** items. Wrap in Christmas paper. Pray for the child who will receive the box.

- <u>Toy Suggestions</u>: Small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, playing cards, stickers, puzzles, games, etc.
- <u>School Supplies</u>: Pens, pencils, sharpeners, crayons, colored markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, blunt pointed scissors, or regular ones for older children, glue, colored craft paper.
- <u>Hygiene Items</u>: Tooth brushes, tooth paste, mild bar soap in wrapper, combs, washcloths, hand towels, and small shampoo.
- Other items: Candy appropriate for age of child, T-shirts, socks, gloves, adjustable ball caps, hair clips, jewelry, flash light (extra batteries), Christmas mugs, hot chocolate packets, gift certificates to Hardee's, McDonald's, etc.

Creation Care Team is constantly researching latest innovative techniques or practices that are helping our environment. Below is just a few.

No Single Use Plastic Bottles At Royal Portrush in Ireland during Open Championship / When The Golf Open Championship returned to one of Northern Ireland's most iconic venues this summer, pure fresh water was delivered directly to fans, players, staff and officials through water-refilling stations and special edition reusable stainless steel bottles. Singleuse plastic water bottles were not used.



"We have all learned so much of the destructive impact of plastic in the world's oceans and we believe we have to take steps to remove all single-use plastic water bottles from The Open in order to encourage fans and players to use alternative and more sustainable materials" said the chief executive. They are hopeful that all organizations will start to look at how they can reduce single use plastic bottles and cups at their events.





Dominion Energy's newest solar farm located on Route 14 in Gloucester County went live on April 22, 2019. The solar farm has 80,724 panels across 203 acres of land, which will produce enough electricity to power approximately 5,000 homes at peak output. The Economic Development Director ,Sherry Spring, said, "Solar projects are a way to generate income for the next generation of landowners who may not want to farm, but want to keep land intact and in the family. "



Texas has generated more electricity from wind than coal in 2019!

HOUSTON — Data released July 8 by the Electric Reliability Council of Texas shows wind created nearly 22 percent of the electricity used so far this year compared to 21 percent made by coal. It's a close margin, but NPR Austin reports this is the first time ever wind has surpassed coal as an energy source in the Lone Star State. (Texas is the largest consumer of coal in the United States, according to the ERC.)

- We will use the church kitchen and social hall Friday, November 8th for all the prep work (chopping potatoes, celery, onions, etc) and staging. Additionally, we will set up two stew pots and 2 potato cookers.
- Of course, the day of the sale Saturday November 9th we will need the kitchen and social hall as well.
- Pick-up will be from 1:00 to 4:30 Saturday at the same \$8 per quart as last stew.
- Out total stew effort this time will require about 12 to 15 UMM to support the various assignments from product procurement to preparation to cooking to packaging to cleanup and lastly sales / distribution. They're one swell group of volunteers - let's make it a success by selling every quart!
- Profits will support Central Church and community outreach,
