

Shoe Boxes for Christmas

The Mission and Evangelism Team continues its sponsorship of the shoebox ministry for needy children in the Mathews Community. The boxes will be distributed through the Mathews Social Services Christmas Store.

Bring filled boxes to the fellowship hall by Sunday, December 1st.

Shoe Box: Use any empty, clean box. Attach a separate piece of paper to the box and label it for a boy or girl and age category: 2-4, 5-6, 7-9 or 10-14 years. Fill with a variety of all **new** items. Wrap in Christmas paper. Pray for the child who will receive the box.

Toy Suggestions: Small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, playing cards, stickers, puzzles, games, etc.

School Supplies: Pens, pencils, sharpeners, crayons, colored markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, blunt pointed scissors, or regular ones for older children, glue, colored craft paper.

Hygiene Items: Tooth brushes, tooth paste, mild bar soap in wrapper, combs, washcloths, hand towels, and small shampoo.

Other items: Candy appropriate for age of child, T-shirts, socks, gloves, adjustable ball caps, hair clips, jewelry, flash light (extra batteries), Christmas mugs, hot chocolate packets, gift certificates to Hardee's, McDonald's, etc.

The news is filled with all the disastrous environmental stories. Creation Care thought it would start to share a few positive environmental stories that don't make the daily news.

Shell Pledges \$300 Million to Reforestation



Oil and gas companies are not exactly top of mind when thinking about businesses who give back to the environment, but **Royal Dutch Shell** is at least trying to make a difference. Over the next three years, the massive oil producer will spend **\$300 million** on planting trees and regenerating forests around the world. One such project is to plant more than **5 million trees in Spain and the Netherlands**.

The initiative and others by Shell are aimed to offset the carbon emissions produced when customers consume the fossil fuels that Shell produces.



NYC Puts Fighting Climate Change Into Law

New legislation in the Big Apple known as the "**Climate Mobilization Act**" was passed in April to radically change what the city is doing to fight climate change. At the center of the legislation, the bill requires buildings larger than 25,000 square feet to cut their emissions **40% by 2030 and over 80% by 2050!**

This is by far one of the most ambitious efforts by a major metropolis to reduce the impact cities have on climate change. "We are on the precipice of climate disaster, and New York City is acting," City Council Speaker Corey Johnson said in a statement after the bills passed. "I hope other cities follow suit."





Prayer and Fasting for the Healing of the Nation

Dear Virginia Annual Conference,

As I type this letter, I write it with an urgency to call the entire conference to join me and the Call to Action Work Group for Racial Justice and Reconciliation for a three day period of “Prayer and Fasting for the Healing of the Nation” from **October 31 - November 2, 2020** from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

I encourage everyone to commit to fasting and praying during these three days that we might be more aware of Christ’s presence in our personal lives, the Commonwealth, and the nation. Prayer is essential to sustain our faith and fasting calls us to refocus our attention and listen for God.

The Apostle Paul reminds us in Ephesians 6:12 *“For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms.”*

We can no longer pretend and turn a blind eye that our nation is in the midst of trouble. We are witnessing the tension between party lines coupled with our anger that governs our speech. We are fighting two pandemics—COVID-19 and systemic racism— that have taken the lives of individuals and forced us into a world of pain and suffering.

How are we as Christians called to act in this unprecedented time? How are we as Christians called to live out our civic duties? I believe God is calling us to a time for deeper soul searching, reflection, and repentance that leads us to daily prayer and fasting. Our *United Methodist Church Social Principles* state, “we hold governments responsible for the protection of the rights of people to free and fair elections.” I encourage all of you in the Commonwealth to exercise your right to vote as we seek God’s direction for our country.

In the designated twelve-hour period, I encourage you to pray, fast, and spend time with God. You may choose a total, water, partial or juice fast. Please fast only if your 2 health allows it at this time. If you can’t restrict your food or liquid intake abstain from something else – like social media, watching television, fast foods, desserts, etc.

I pray as an annual conference we will experience the power and presence of God in an extraordinary way as we commit ourselves from October 31 to November 2, 2020 to pray for the healing of the nation.
