Old Methodist Tabernacle 700 Tabernacle Road, Mathews



## From the Pastor's Pen Be Still ... an Invitation

(A meditation based on Psalm 46)

"For the hundredth time, would you please be still!" The mother's voice revealed growing exasperation with her 3-year-old who squirmed and wiggled on the bench in the waiting room. But he simply could not keep himself in one place. All around him were invitations to explore: doors that led somewhere - but where? Chairs to climb on, tables with magazines and hundreds of pages to turn, an aquarium with colorful fish playing hide-and-seek among strange aquatic plants. How could he keep still with all those distractions?

By the time you and I got through elementary school, most of us managed to tame our bodies enough to sit through classes, church services, and doctors' waiting rooms. However, have you ever noticed that your mind refuses to be still and "sit" there with your body? You might be reclining in your favorite chair or even lying quietly in bed, but your mind is elsewhere, thinking about unfinished chores, dreaming about vacation, or worrying about health and family matters.

In times of crisis, our minds tend to focus on all the negative events swirling chaotically around us, until they become larger than life and threaten to consume us. We are robbed of sleep and spend our waking hours dreading what might happen in the days to come. Peace eludes us, and God may seem distant and impersonal. In our rush to try to fix things ourselves, we - like the toddler in perpetual motion – fail to stop and allow God to infuse us with divine peace and renewed perspective.

Well acquainted with our squirmy nature, the psalmist offers an antidote for us when we are facing fearful and uncertain times. He begins with a statement of faith: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble..."

He lists several things – all outside human control – that can raise our fears: changes in the earth, volcanic activity on the ocean

floor, stormy seas, and trembling mountains. Further on, he refers to nations in an uproar, tottering kingdoms, and wars – all results of human activity. But always, the psalmist reminds us of God's presence even in the midst of calamity: "God is in the midst of the city..., the Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge" (or fortress). 1

The key to allowing this passage to speak peace to our fearful and squirmy souls is in verse 10: "Be still, and know that I am God! I am exalted among the nations, I am exalted in the earth."

Ah, there it is again: the command, more invitational this time, to "be still." Why? Because as long as we are running our lives under our own steam, we cannot know God up close and personal. We have to quit squirming, stop allowing ourselves to be distracted by everything going on around us, and get still! "Be still, and know that I am God!"

This is not an invitation to pray and pour our hearts out to God (although that is a good thing, too!); rather, we stop our busyness for, say, 10-15 minutes each day and just sit quietly, letting the Holy One work within us however the Spirit desires. If you feel that you just have to do something, quietly meditate on Psalm 46, allowing the knowledge that "the Lord of hosts is with us" – even with you – to permeate your life and fill you with God's quiet presence and renewed strength.

#### **Finance Committee**

2014

We are almost three quarters of the way through 2014 and I want to report on how we are doing financially. As of the end of August, general offering was \$101,872 which is up about 5% compared to this point in 2012 and 2013. This is really an encouraging sign and we are grateful for the generosity Central's people as it enables our church to continue our outreach and mission.

On the downside, our general expenses are \$116,223 year to date, which represents a deficit versus income of \$14,351. A non-recurring item was about \$6,000 for a new heat pump. This shortfall is being made up using savings and endowment investment income.

We are now preparing the budget for 2015 using input from committees, general operating expenses, and conference; and even though we are being very conservative, some increases cannot be avoided. Thus we are facing a challenge. Perhaps we have not been immune to problems others have faced with the general economy, slower growth, rising costs, and some attrition. Everyone's contribution regardless of size is important and is needed to continue Central's mission in our community and beyond.


