### Seven Secrets

Twenty eight young people from the Mathews Boys and Girls Club's Summer Program participated in Central's Creation Care Recycle Class. They were between the ages of 6 and 13. The Team of youths had fun learning the "7 secrets of the Dump." After each lesson, names were drawn. The chosen youths raced the clock to transport a particular bit of trash, such as cardboard or plastic, to the correct recycle table. Everyone was cheering for their teammates. After a while they were raising their hands to volunteer.

The Director of the Club, Andrew Wickliffe, said that we held their interest from the first minute to the very end of the program. He stated that they also loved the prizes: magic balls that flashed light when you bounced them, as well as picking one book each to keep from a selection of about 80 books.

Our goal was to help young people get excited about the importance of recycling. Director Wickliffe mentioned that they talked about it when they returned to the club. A son and parent have already made plans to set up recycling in their home. The Mathews Boys and Girls Club would like to have another presentation for the regular school year kids.

Creation Care, as a team, worked many hours to produce this class. Greg Lewis donated his valuable skills in helping us set up the video aids. We are thankful to David Hudgins for recycling a gazillion tons of trash that we had collected for many weeks for the Recycle Program.

### From the Pastor's Pen

Years ago I was in Santiago, Dominican Republic, working with a local church for a week of outreach projects. One evening, after a particularly moving worship service, people began to disperse—except for two young men. They stood in embrace, weeping on each other's neck. I instantly recognized them as a couple of youths whom I had seen exchanging a few sharp words earlier in the day.

One of them, Omar, was an intelligent and charismatic lad who loved to dance. He was often the first to show up and help around the church, and he was endeared by everyone. I also knew that he was a target of jealousy by some youths. Clearly something had blown up between Omar and the other boy. It was just a sharp retort followed by another, but it was enough to break the genial spirit we had enjoyed all week.

I was stunned to see these otherwise normal kids overcome by the power of the Holy Spirit. I did not understand the words, but clearly they were asking for forgiveness, over and over again. After some fifteen minutes, they still had not separated! By this time the other youths were already in the buses. People were getting anxious, and the mission pastor's wife was becoming incensed. The buses could not wait much longer. But that evening we all waited, and everybody went home a little late.

I often think of that episode when we celebrate the Holy Communion, including the Peace. Our hugs and handshakes stand for God's gift of reconciliation, something that only the Spirit of God can give. You might say that The Peace is sacramental, because it, too, is an outward sign of inward grace (a classic definition of sacrament).

The Communion itself is a sign-act for a truly holy gift, something similar to what God did

for those two young men. It is nothing less than an encounter with God, though it comes through the common things of bread and juice. We can think of it this way: Ideally, taking part in the Holy Communion is a mysterious but real meeting with Jesus. Just as God became an ordinary man in Jesus, so he gives himself to us today through those common elements that we eat and drink.

Therefore there will always be an element in the Holy Communion that defies human understanding. On one level it is an event that we need to plan and execute appropriately; on another level, it is a supper with Christ. In our recent Gospel lessons Jesus repeatedly says, "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life." The main idea is that we do not simply acquire Jesus as

possession, either as knowledge or power; but we receive and 'digest' him in a way that changes us from deep within.

You can see why the United Methodist Church's General Conference in 2004 adopted a study titled *This Holy Mystery*, which recommends that our congregations move towards a weekly celebration of the sacrament, and that

a complete Sunday service include the Word as well as the Table. John Wesley reportedly took Communion up to five times a week. At the same time, however, it does place a great burden and responsibility to plan the occasion in a faithful manner.

In the past two months I have been frequently asked about our church's practice of the Holy Communion. Everyone clearly shares a desire for the sacrament to be special. So far there has been really one thing I wanted to say, i.e. that I hope we recognize and grow in the spiritual meaning of the sacrament—it is a meal with Jesus. If it is the most impressive display of solemnity and yet not a supper with Jesus, then it is not true sacrament; even if it was a humble and ordinary celebration but is

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continued from page 2 a supper with Jesus, then its value cannot be measured.

My hope is that, regardless of how often it is served, or who administers it, we will continue to make it for ourselves a supper with Jesus by faith. Every time there is a Communion, let us consider ourselves invited by the very Jesus. He is gracious to come to us through the word and the Spirit.



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### **Finance**

We are over halfway through the year, so it is a good time to take a look at how we are doing financially. As of the end of July, our Operating Expenses were \$94,603. These were routine expenses such as conference apportionment, salaries, maintenance, utilities, office, etc. and are paid for almost entirely out of general non-designated offerings, which were \$88,060. We are running a deficit of over \$5,000 so far this year.

For church improvements, rather than routine services, we can draw on our Hudgins endowment income which thus far has not been used. Otherwise, we have to draw from savings. There is adequate reserve in savings to cover our deficit, but we cannot sustain this indefinitely.

Offerings are running about 2% ahead of the average for the previous three years, but are about even with 2014, which was also a deficit year. Growth in offerings at Central peaked around 2011 and has been mostly flat ever since, while expenses have continued to climb.

I am hopeful that Central will return to the growth that we had in previous years and can continue our outreach. Help us do that, and remember to tithe.


