Pastor's Pondering

It was on May 28, 1970, that my parents got married. 54 years have passed since they covenanted before God and each other to join together in holy marriage. That is quite an accomplishment if you ask me! It has taken work, intentionality, laughter, and daily deciding to choose each other.

In the span of 54 years, I know there have been moments of great joy and great frustration. In the span of 54 years, there have been tears and sadness as well as great joy and celebration. It hasn't, however always been easy over the last 54 years for them. Despite the hard times, I am grateful for their love and example they have set not only for me but for my sisters and countless others. I guess I am pondering today on their anniversary, how many things they have experienced and the changes they have seen right before their eyes over the course of their marriage up to this point.

In 54 years, there were certain things that they agreed on as well as those things that they disagreed on (some emphatically so). They came to times where they had to talk things through and then move on. They still may have not agreed but they chose to move on. This had to be difficult. It had to be hard to agree to disagree with someone they loved deeply and yet move forward.

We sometimes find my parents struggles to be like our own even in the life of the church. I know that Central has been together for many more than 54 years. I also know that there have been times of great joy as well as great sorrow. I know that there have been times when we have agreed with one another and likewise, times when we've disagreed. 2024 Annual VA Conference

Bishop Sue Haupert-Johnson is excited to announce the theme of the 242nd session of the Virginia Annual Conference is A Conference in Three Movements. This theme emerges from the belief that there are three principal movements of the Holy Spirit taking place in the present era of the church:

- 1. The theological movement from prevenient grace to sanctification. This is the movement of the Holy Spirit in the human heart.
- 2. The historical movement of Methodism captured in our past, lived in our present, and pointed toward our future. This is the movement of the Holy Spirit in the church.
- 3. The missional movement from gathered spaces into all the world. This is the movement of the Holy Spirit in community.

These movements build upon each other, intertwining together to demonstrate what has been, what is, and what will be as God continues to move amongst God's people.

The Annual Conference logo is designed to be an embodiment of this powerful theme. The three flames joining as one light are a reminder of the three movements and the connection they share. The placement of words and font selection are meant to evoke an imaginative sense of movement and the constant motion of the Holy Spirit. The color family of reds, yellows, and oranges is meant to offer a sense of fire that is sparking and burning within the Virginia Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Creation Care

Rethink! We used to think of the earth's benefits as endless. Earth is telling us we need to think again. If we want our children and grands to live well, we need to support a more sustainable way of being now. Remember you are a caretaker. Let that sacred charge be your guide. Below are three suggestions to try for May and June.

Turn Off Your Electronics

If you're going to be away from your computer or other appliance for more than an hour, turn it off as you leave the room. Some people mistakenly think it takes a giant burst of



energy to power up a television, computer, etc so they leave these electronics on continuously. However, even on an "energysaver" setting, they waste much more energy when it's on all day than if you really turn it off.

Eliminate "Phantom Load"




Action: Many electronics use electricity even when they're turned off—so your best bet is to unplug electronic devices and appliances when they're

not in use for long periods. (Or, plug your TV and accessories into one power strip and switch off the whole strip to eliminate this "phantom load."

Why: At least five percent of the average household's monthly utility bill goes towards powering devices that are turned off. TVs, DVD players, computers, printers, and cell phone chargers are just some of the devices that leak power even when they aren't onin fact, a quarter of the energy used by your TV each year is consumed when the TV is off.

Wash Clothes in Cold Water

Action: Turn the knob on your washing machine to "cold/cold" today, and leave it there.




Lieutenant Colonel Trey Guy


