Each Monday morning the Virginia
United Methodist Foundation
(VAUMF) sends an uplifting
message to followers of the
VAUMC. It is called the "Monday
Morning Start-Up". This one is entitled Treat
Others with Compassion, Love and Dignity. I
wanted to share it with you.

"...Jesus showed us how to love the marginalized. The synagogue leaders respected the Sabbath law and never thought about the needs of the less fortunate. Luke 13:14 tells us that when Jesus saw an ill woman at the Temple, He was moved with compassion. Jesus looked beyond the law and saw this woman as one of God's creative creatures in need of help. Jesus then "put His hands on her, and immediately she straightened up and praised God." (v. 13)

The leader of the synagogue was upset by this because it was the Sabbath. Jesus, who is the Lord of the Sabbath (Luke 6:5), chose to heal this woman who struggled with pain and humiliation for nearly two decades. Now she was pain-free.

Have you ever experienced rejection or were made to feel inadequate because you didn't measure up to someone's expectations? May you never be like the synagogue leader who thought more about rules than the people placed in front of him. May we treat others with dignity and respect whether they look like us or not. #### September Mission Focus: Meals on Wheels

The Mission Focus of the month is adopted by the Administrative Council.



Bay Aging's Meals on Wheels program accomplishes much more than providing sustenance to homebound seniors. Meals on Wheels volunteers are a lifeline for seniors, provide friendship and safety checks for the people they serve.

Mathews County Meals on Wheels program serves about 135 eligible persons at no cost to them. Volunteers deliver a hot nutritional meal Monday – Friday to the Homebound frail and seniors here in the county.

Laura Matthews, Mathews Meals on Wheels Coordinator and Mathews Active Lifestyle Center Mgr. in Mathews, said, "We are thankful to Mathews County Public Schools for the incredible, home-cooked meals they prepare for our seniors every week. Unfortunately, without more volunteers it is difficult to reach as many of our neighbors as we need to."

## Let's Recycle!

Having a gathering at your home, church or work this summer? Please take the time to make available recycle containers for the most important recycle items:







The following are the only materials that can be 100 percent recycled:

Aluminum cans., #1 & #2 Plastic items, Unbroken glass.

#### What Is Recycled Aluminum Used For?



Aluminum is a product that can be recycled indefinitely without any reduction in the quality of the materials. There is a high demand for aluminum, so most cans you throw into the recycling are turned into new products in weeks. In fact, 50,000 aluminum cans are produced every minute.

The separated aluminum is taken to a processing plant, and the cans are shredded. These pieces are melted into sheets and made into new cans and aluminum foil. Aluminum is also made into car parts, airplane parts and the bodies of tractor-trailer trucks. Using recycled aluminum to make new cans saves 95% of the energy from mining the resources and producing the cans from ore.

#### **Recycling Glass:**



Glass is another material that can be reused and recycled indefinitely to make new glass products. It is far more energyefficient and easier to make glass products from recycled

glass than raw materials. Glass is 100% recyclable and can be recycled endlessly without losing quality or purity.

#### **Recycled Plastics:**

Plastic can be a little more complicated to recycle than other materials. This complexity is because different plastics are made from different types of resin. Take a look at the bottom of a plastic container, and you will see an identifying number. This number tells you what kind of plastic makes up the container. The different types of plastic cannot be mixed because they melt at different temperatures. (In Mathews, must be #1 or #2 bottle or jug with narrow neck or pouring spout.)

The plastic is sorted by type, and then each type is sent off to a processing facility. At the processing facility, the plastic is fed into a grinder and chopped into plastic flakes.

These flakes are melted down into a polymer that manufacturers can use to make new plastic products.
